NATIONAL & REGIONAL NEWS

The Colorado Springs (COS), Colorado Chapter Commander, Colonel Kermit Neal, USAF (Ret) had the honor of presenting the MOWW Lufbery Award to United States Air Force Academy (USAFA) Cadet Griffin T. Peter from Rochester, NY. The MOWW Lufbery Award is a National Level award that recognizes the Outstanding USAFA Cadet in a Western Language Minor. Cadet Peter won the award for his excellence in French language studies. He graduated on 31 May 2024 and will be pursuing a Master's Degree in Mechanical Engineering at Purdue University while awaiting an assignment to pilot training. The Lufbery award is presented annually in memory of Major Gervais Raoul

Victor Lufbery

(March 14, 1885 -May 19, 1918) who was a French and American fighter pilot and flying ace in World War I. Because he served in both the French Air Force and later the **United States Army** Air Service in World War I. he is sometimes listed alternately as a French ace or as an American ace. Officially, all but one of his 17 combat victories came while flying in French

units. The USAFA Department of Foreign Languages faculty determines the recipient on behalf of the Order.

REGION XIII NEWS

Chapter Adjutant participated in the Region XIII Spring Conference on Friday, 14 June. This virtual session was a recap of the Region's Chapter Action Reports (CARs) for each Chapter. The Chapter can expect CAR reporting changes resulting from the national convention. The Staff will align CAR changes with CAP ensuring synchronization with Chapter policies and procedures.

HISTORIAN ARTICLE

DIEN BIEN PHU; THE SIEGE OF KHE SANH AND OUTPOST KEATING

Dien Bien Phu, Khe Sanh and Outpost Keating were three different battles in three different conflicts where aerial resupply was relied upon for the survival of the garrison. Dien Bien Phu occurred during the First Indochina War (French vs Viet Minh), Second Indochina War (US vs North Vietnam/Viet Cong), and Outpost Keating (US vs Taliban). The Viet Minh defeated the French in battle from March 13 – May 7. Tactically the French base was at the bottom of a "rice bowl" where the Viet Minh controlled the surrounding high ground with artillery and anti-aircraft batteries¹. Dien Bien Phu was one of the few battles where the anti-aircraft weapons were depressed downward with great effect. French aerial resupply eventually failed when the Viet Minh artillery destroyed the airfield and anti-aircraft fire took a toll on resupplying aircraft.

The Second Indochina War featured prominently the siege of the Marine base at Khe Sanh from Jan 21 – July 9. North Vietnamese surrounded the Marine base forcing the Marine garrison to rely on American cargo aircraft and helicopters to keep the base supplied. The siege of Khe Sanh took on added strategic importance with President Johnson not wanting a duplication of the fall of Dien Bien Phu². By the end of the battle, American air assets delivered 19,017 tons of supplies to Khe Sanh until a ground force broke the siege and established a secure road for resupply³. Eventually American forces would abandon the Khe Sanh base as no longer necessary.

A similar situation on a smaller scale evolved in Afghanistan with the siege of Combat Outpost (COP) Keating (aka The Battle of Kamdesh) on October 3,

2009. A force of 300 Taliban assaulted COP Keating near the town of Kamdesh in Nuristan Province in eastern Afghanistan. The attack on COP Keating resulted in 8 Americans killed and 27 wounded while the Taliban suffered 150–200 killed⁴. Combined with difficult conditions for air supply, and little support from the local population, supply to Camp Keating on November 26, 2006, was wholly inadequate. As it became obvious that COP Keating was too isolated, indefensible, and impossible to supply. In this case COP Keating's location placed a severe strain on defending the OP. Surrounded by three mountains overlooking the OP made the OP difficult to defend or resupply. The constant attacks on the land logistics supply route and reliance on air support resulted in plans to close it beginning in December 2008⁵. Unfortunately, events

transpired on Oct 3 attack which almost resulted in the Taliban overrunning the outpost. But for the heroic actions of the defenders of COP Keating and the air support provided (F15E, B1B, A-10s, and AH-64s) the outpost could have fallen to the Taliban. In the aftermath of the battle COP Keating was evacuated on Oct 6 with a B1B laying wasted to what remained of COP Keating. (See this <u>link</u> for information on Battle of Camp Keating.)

NATIONAL PROGRAM -ARTICLE HOMELAND SECURITY (HS)

United States Secret Service (USSS)

The USSS is a federal law



enforcement agency under the Department of Homeland Security with the purpose of conducting investigations into currency and financial-payment crime, and protecting U.S. political leaders, their families, and visiting heads of state or government.

The USSS has an integrated mission of protection and investigations to ensure the safety and security of our protectees, key locations, and events of national significance. We also protect the integrity of our currency and investigate crimes against the U.S. financial system committed by criminals around the world and in cyberspace.

Recent events resulted in scrutiny over their protectee mission. Threats to protectees constantly evolve and are exceedingly complex. Since our protective mission began in 1901, our protective work has expanded to not only include traditional physical protection, but also protection against threats from airspace, cyber systems and chemical and biological weapons.

Permanent protectees, such as the president and vice president, have special agents permanently assigned to them. Temporary protectees -- such as presidential and vice presidential candidates or nominees and foreign heads of state -- are staffed with special agents on temporary assignment from USSS field offices. Protection for the President and Vice President of the United States is mandatory. All other individuals entitled to protection may decline security if they choose.

NATIONAL SECURITY (NS)

Joint Communications Support Element (JCSE)

The Joint Communications Support Element

(Airborne) (JCSE) is a United States Department of Defense (DoD) standing joint force headquarters expeditionary communications provider that can provide rapid deployable, enroute, early entry, and scalable command, control, communications, and computer (C4) support to the unified combatant commands, special



operations commands, and other agencies as directed by the Joint Chiefs of Staff.] On order, the JCSE can provide additional C4 services within 72 hours to support larger combined joint task force headquarters across the full spectrum of operations. JCSE is part of the Joint Enabling Capabilities Command (JECC), a subordinate command of the U.S. Transportation Command (USTRANSCOM).

Unit was activated in 1961 under US Strike Command for communications support during the Cuban Missile Crisis. Eventually US Readiness Command would replace US Strike Command as the administrative Combatant Command over JCSE. JCSE remained under operational control of the Joint Chiefs of Staff through Memorandum of Policy (MOP). Since its inception JCSE has participated in every major contingency operation, or conflict involving the United States. Their motto "The Voice Heard Around The World" is reflective of their mission.

JCSE's mission was to provide the "joint" communications interoperability required to support a Joint Task Force (JTF) Headquarters and Joint Specialized Operations Task Force (JSOTF) achieved by having JCSE elements supporting both ends of the communications links from higher to lower command (i.e., JTF HQs to component Air Force HQ, Navy HQ, Army HQ, Special Operations Task Force). JCSE was the only DOD unit with this mission to support joint combatant and joint specified commands.

JCSE's mission has evolved since its inception in 1961. The unit is currently assigned to US Transportation Command (USTRANSCOM) and a component of the Joint Enabling Capabilities Command U.S. Transportation Command.

National Airborne Day – August 16, 2024

National Airborne Day is recognized every year on August 16th. In 2002, President George W. Bush

created the holiday commemorating the first official Army parachute jump on August 16, 1940. The history of airborne forces began after World War I, when Brigadier General William Mitchell first conceived the

idea of parachuting troops into combat. During World War II, airborne tactics were critical to the success of important missions including the D-Day invasion and the Battle of the Bulge. Airborne tactics remain a vital role in military combat missions today.
